Some facts about The United **States Pony Clubs, Inc.**



Pony Club is a misnomer; it is not a club for ponies. It is an educational organization that teaches horsemanship and the care of horses and ponies. Pony Club is a worldwide organization that originated in Great Britain. The United States Pony Clubs (USPC) was founded as a non-profit national youth horsemanship organization

- ? There are over 200 different breeds of horses in the world, with approximately 151 breeds in the United States. courtesy The North American Horsemens Association


Today, there are over 640 Pony Clubs nationwide – including Alaska and Hawaii – with over 12,500 members. Generally, Pony Club members range in age from as young as 5 to age 21 (for the next three years, members may be 25 as part of a beta program). Riding activities include Eventing, Mounted Games, Show Jumping, Dressage, Vaulting (horseback gymnastics), Polo, Polocrosse (combination of polo and lacrosse), Foxhunting, and Tetrathlon (riding, running, swimming, shooting). USPC also offers a knowledge-based competition called Quiz. Pony Club offers team competition, so members learn the importance of cooperation and friendship. At rallies, there is no help from parents. Youngsters help each other (with qualified adults nearby).




An important part of rallies is horse care, which is judged from the beginning of the rally. Pony Club

members learn to ride and care for their mounts safely and well and become very responsible young adults - and have fun as well.

Pony Club members progress through a standard rating system (something like Boy and Girl Scouts' ranks) that requires them to learn more and more about horses and Leg Markings, I to r: coronet, half pastern, sock, half cannon, stocking their care and to become increasingly accomplished riders. Ratings begin at the D level and progress upwards. The Pony Club member who reaches the "A" rating is a highly competent and knowledgeable young horsewoman or horseman.




